### Spiritual Care at the End of Life - Steve Nolan

The author is a palliative care chaplain at Princess Alice Hospice in Surrey and a tutor in Chaplaincy Studies at St. Michael's College, Llanduff, part of Cardiff University. This thoughtful and inquisitive book explores the nature of hope in its different forms at different stages of terminal illness and investigates the underlying theory that spiritual care is rooted in relationships.
