Faith in Older People Update

The contribution of faith communities to the care of older people

Following the survey which FiOP undertook in 2013 a commitment was made to organise follow up events to examine the issues which emerged in more detail. The first of these events brought together representatives of faith communities; voluntary sector and statutory bodies to review the outcomes and to highlight the key issues which required attention to ensure that the contribution of faith communities was recognised and that they were included in the planning of services for older people in their areas. Dying well and why it matters

In March 2014 Faith in Older People held its annual Malcolm Goldsmith Lecture which was given by Rabbi Baroness Julia Neuberger. The subject was 'Dying Well and why it matters'. The lecture was attended by 250 people and created considerable discussion so it was decided to undertake a follow-up event in the format of a civic café which would allow small group discussion around the twelve principles she referred to in the lecture. The event took place in early May and was attended by 40 people.

There is a growing interest and openness in considering issues around death and dying and several organisations are involved in stimulating the 'conversations'. Faith in Older People is a stakeholder member of the Good Life; Good Death; Good Grief programme set up by the Scottish Palliative Care Partnership and has participated in the conversations on this issue led by Edinburgh University Chaplaincy. The three organisations felt that it was important to collaborate in facilitating this event as a contribution to 'Death Awareness Week' which would take place soon after this event. To read the full report please go to our website. There was a huge emphasis on the importance of being able to have the 'conversation'.

The method we used of a 'civic cafe' was very simple and enabled people to work in small groups but also to move group if they wished. This is one way of bringing people together for this critical discussion but there are many other ways. Together with our partners in this event we would wish your faith community or organisation to think about facilitating such an event.
