A WORKSHOP FOR <u>CLERGY AND</u> <u>PEOPLE IN AUTHORISED</u> <u>MINISTRIES</u> -'WE NEED TO TALK ABOUT DYING'

Date: Thursday 21 September 2017 Venue: The Grosvenor Hilton Hotel, Edinburgh Registration 9.30am; Finish 4.00pm Cost: £40.00

This day workshop will offer support and tools to enhance confidence in having pastoral conversations about death and dying. Using a model from the field of bereavement to explore emotional, psychological and spiritual responses and building on the experiences of the participants, the day will resource those who attend to go deeper in their pastoral encounters with people who are actively addressing their own mortality. The day will be facilitated by Rev Canon Dr Marion Chatterley. Marion has extensive experience of working with younger people who are facing their own mortality and has a particular interest in bereavement theory.

The programme assumes a degree of personal sharing and therefore participation is restricted to clergy and others in authorised ministries within the churches.

Dementia and Faith Communities – Grow with Us

FiOP has been working over the past 18 months to develop guidance for faith communities on supporting people with dementia in their congregations. The work builds on a significant body of evidence from a range of organisations and highlights many helpful resources and has been led by Professor Mary Marshall and Jenny Henderson. We want to make this work a dynamic and living resource to which people can contribute over time and to this end we would like to develop an 'Affiliate' programme which congregations can join. We hope in due course to offer on-line support.

To date we have made presentations, held workshops and addressed several different faith communities. The feed- back has been good and we would like to offer the following either separately or as individual groups request:

- A short introductory talk on the guide
- A capacity building session which would build on the questions raised in the guide and pertinent to a congregation
- This structured session could be for one congregation or a group of congregations or on a multi-faith basis. This would be the decision of the group.

As a small voluntary organisation, it will be necessary to charge a fee so that we can continue to develop the programme.

Spiritual Care in Care Homes



This project is supported by the Life Changes Trust and is progressing well. The survey of all care homes in Scotland to ascertain the understanding of spiritual care and what education is undertaken has been completed and the outcomes will be disseminated in the autumn of this year. In parallel a series of workshops have been held for identified care homes to develop an approach to support the spiritual lives of people with dementia – the Purple Bicycle. Our project leads are Simon Jaquet and Harriet Mowat.

Enhancing Spiritual Care

Faith in Older People in collaboration with NHS Lothian Spiritual Care Unit held a conference to consider the importance and awareness of spiritual care issues in a healthcare setting, the different practices in health board areas and the availability of education. The focus of the conference was around the results of a study undertaken by Faith in Older People. The conference report on 'Enhancing Spiritual Care' and is available from the Faith in Older People website. The report makes several recommendations for action and will be widely disseminated.

Just Festival – A Conversation

Faith in Older People was pleased to hold a conversation attended by 40 people as part of the JUST Festival in August. Chaired by the Rt Rev Bruce Cameron, the topic was 'Faith and Ageing' and our panellists were Rabbi David Rose, Asif Sheikh and Rev John Bell each representing a perspective of ageing from their faith.



There was a strong focus on the contribution made by older people to our society and the importance of respecting age and the wisdom and experience it can bring. We have to acknowledge that growing old does not necessarily make us benign or full of wisdom! There was a common theme of older people holding the stories of our communities and the ethics underpinning our society. It is important to get away from the negative conations of ageing but to focus more strongly on the reciprocal support that can be offered through the ages.

Faith in Older People and Church of Scotland Guild A Consultation on the role of the churches in combatting loneliness and isolation

This consultation was arranged to take forward a project supported by ACTS to look at the place of older people in the work of the churches and is intended to build on the work of Faith in Older People, the Church of Scotland Guild and others to consider how churches might develop their work with older people in terms of worship, prayer and action.

A current key issue for both Government, statutory and voluntary organisations is that of loneliness and isolation which is a matter of concern to churches.
