

"Spirituality encompasses wide ranging attitudes and practices which focus on the search for meaning in human lives, particularly in terms of relationships, values and the arts". The positive effects of music and singing are well documented.

The principles and approach of personcentredness is central to the new Health and Social Care Standards which will inform the inspection framework.

TO ABSENT FRIENDS

Over the years FiOP has had a focus on end of life issues. This has ranged from a Malcolm Goldsmith Lecture given by Rabbi Baroness Neuberger, civic cafe workshops to training for pastoral carers and for clergy. We stress the importance of having the 'conversation' about wishes for end of life from the practical to the spiritual and to find ways of remembering those who have died by way of celebrating their lives but also to provide comfort to those who are bereaved.

The Good Life; Good Death; Good Grief initiative from the Scottish Partnership on Palliative Care through its 'Absent Friends' programme provides illustrations of how conversations can be enabled.

Spiritual Care Matters is a series of e-learning courses for front-line staff working in care homes, health and other care settings.

What matters most - for older people?

Supporting the spiritual needs of older people

This course will help you build confidence, skills and resilience to support the spiritual well-being of older people.

The course explores how spiritual care is defined, what it means in practice and why it matters to support the spiritual needs of older people. What matters most – for care staff?

Looking after your own spiritual well-being

This course speaks directly to care workers and their need to develop tools for coping in emotionally demanding situations.

The course explores why it is important to look after yourself, builds your skills and confidence and will help you find support when you need it.

What's involved?


